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## Jesus and Nicodemus

JOHN 3:14-21

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

“Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert,  
so must the Son of Man be lifted up,  
so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life.”

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son,  
so that everyone who believes in him might not perish  
but might have eternal life.

For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world,  
but that the world might be saved through him.

Whoever believes in him will not be condemned,  
but whoever does not believe has already been condemned,  
because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God.

And this is the verdict,  
that the light came into the world,  
but people preferred darkness to light,  
because their works were evil.

For everyone who does wicked things hates the light  
and does not come toward the light,  
so that his works might not be exposed.

But whoever lives the truth comes to the light,  
so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

## EXPLORE THE GOSPEL



Either before or after a Sunday meal together, have a designated member of the family read the Gospel. Other family members should listen attentively. Then have each family member share an insight about the Gospel.

Discuss the following questions as a family:

- Jesus said to Nicodemus that “the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light.” Jesus Himself is the light that came into the world. What are some ways we can make sure that His light shines in our lives, our homes, our schools, and the whole world?
- According to today’s Gospel account, why did God send His son Jesus into the world?

## DID YOU KNOW?

The fourth Sunday of Lent is known as “Laetare Sunday”, which comes from the Latin word “Laetare” which means “to rejoice.” These words are from the opening line of today’s liturgy: “Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning...” Traditionally, the vestments worn for this day are rose/pink and it also signifies a shift to the second part of Lent, which focuses very specifically on Jesus’ final journey to Jerusalem and his passion, betrayal, suffering, and death.

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## TIPS FOR EXPLORING THE GOSPEL

- Read the upcoming Sunday Gospel a few days before the weekend. Listen to what God is saying to you.
- Select a part of the story ahead of time and share it with your children. Have them listen for this part of the Gospel during Mass.
- Don’t be afraid to let kids ask honest questions. Be honest if you don’t know something. Tell your child you will look into it and get back to them.

Teach us responsibility towards life, from the first moment of its conception to its last instant on this earth. Teach us a great respect for the gift of life. Teach us to adore deeply the Creator, Father, and Giver of life.

St. Joseph, Patron of human work, assist us in all work, in that vocation of man on earth. Teach us to resolve the difficult problems connected with work in the life of each generation, beginning with the young, and in the life of society.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK Baked Salmon

*In honor of Laetare Sunday where the liturgical color is pink, why not incorporate some pink into your meal? Try this easy baked salmon recipe for a Friday night during Lent!*

#### INGREDIENTS:

- 1 1/2 lb. salmon filet
- 2 T. fresh chopped parsley
- 2 T. olive oil
- 2 T. lemon juice
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 t. Dijon mustard
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/4 t. black pepper
- 1/2 lemon, sliced into 4 rings

#### DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat the oven to 450 degrees and line a baking sheet with foil. Slice the salmon into 4 portions and arrange them on the baking sheet with the skin side down.
2. In a small bowl, combine parsley, olive oil, lemon juice, garlic, mustard, salt, and pepper.
3. Generously spread the marinade over the top and sides of the salmon, then top each piece with a slice of lemon.
4. Bake at 450 degrees for 12-15 minutes or until just cooked through and flaky.
